Speaker Bios

Dr. Jens Hanssen

Jens Hanssen is Associate Professor of Middle Eastern and Mediterranean History, and Arab civilization. He received his D.Phil in Modern History from Oxford University in 2001 and joined the University of Toronto the following year. His Dissertation has been published by Clarendon Press as Fin de Siècle Beirut in 2005. His writings have appeared in The New Cambridge History of Islam, The Routledge Reader of Fin de Siècle History, Critical Inquiry, the International Journal of Middle Eastern Studies and www.hannaharendt.net - Zeitschrift für Politisches Denken. His current research interests include the intersections between urban culture and intellectual production in 19th-and 20th-century Arab history, the global fin de siècle, and German-Jewish echoes in modern Arab thought.

Dr. Şenay Özden

Senay Özden is a cultural anthropologist from Turkey. Her research areas include international migration, refugees, Turkish state's refugee policies, and politics of humanitarian aid. She has numerous articles, reports published on Syrian refugees in Turkey, and hosts a weekly radio program in Turkey about Syrian refugees. After her graduate studies in anthropology at Duke University, she taught at various universities in Damascus and Istanbul. She is one of the founders of the Syrian Cultural House in Istanbul, Hamisch.

Dr. Clemens Reichel

Clemens Reichel (Ph. D, University of Chicago, 2001; M.A., University of London, 1990) is Professor for Mesopotamian Archaeology at the University of Toronto's Department of Near and Middle Eastern Civilizations and Curator for the Ancient Near East at the Royal Ontario Museum. He has excavated widely in the Middle East; between 2004 and 2010 he directed excavations at the site of Hamoukar in northeastern Syria. He is the Director of the Diyala Project, an ongoing online publication of a large archaeological project undertaken by the Oriental Institute (University of Chicago) in Iraq during the 1930s. His research interest and recent publications focus on the emergence of complex societies, urbanism, and prehistoric bureaucracies.

University of Toronto Lifeline Syria

University of Toronto Lifeline Syria is a community response to the humanitarian crisis in Syria by supporting Syrian refugees to come to Canada and resettle in the Greater Toronto Area (GTA), held in partnership with Ryerson University, York University, and OCAD University. As a joint initiative, 75 sponsorship teams will be created to sponsor 75 displaced families of approximately 300 individuals. \$27,000 will be raised for each family, which helps support the financial costs of resettlement for up to one year following their arrival. It is our hope that a combination of these initiatives will be able to help ease the individual suffering of displaced Syrian families.

University of Toronto Scholars at Risk

Here at the University of Toronto, we are establishing a new bursary program for students and scholars at risk. Our goal is to raise \$1 million and create up to 100 bursaries, each valued at \$10,000, which we would disperse over the next 10 years. To support this initiative, U of T is committing \$500,000 to fully match (1:1) donations of any size from students, faculty, staff, alumni, and supporters. U of T will award the bursaries to undergraduate and graduate students who have obtained refugee status in Canada. The bursaries will be open to Syrian students and scholars at risk, but also other refugees who have had their education disrupted by conflict or war. We believe these bursaries will play a powerful role in helping these students and their families rebuild their lives in Canada.


